# Jawaahir Dance Company: Shahrzad

A fun and upbeat modern entrance piece—incorporating various elements of Raqs Sharqi (Classic Egyptian) and folklore vocabulary—this music gives us a mini tour of the Arabic rhythms and styles!

# **Nilay:** Lingo Lingo Şişeler

This composition is a fusion of traditional Turkish spoon dance and modern Turkish folklorico in a remastered version of this traditional Turkish folk song that talks about a foolish drunk in a jollification.

# Nritya Kalakshetra Academy: Parshwapathe Shambho

This song is an homage to Lord Shiva: his flowing matted hair that holds the sacred river Ganga, symbolizing purity and life; his third eye, which represents his inner wisdom and cosmic vision; and his dance of Tandava, a powerful movement of cosmic rhythm that symbolizes destruction and rebirth, the endless cycle of creation.

## **Ethnic Dance Theatre:** Ragsi Charkhzananda

This is a dance of the Tajiks, an Iranian speaking people who live in modern day Tajikistan, Uzbekistan, and Afghanistan. The dance features sinuous arm movements and dizzying spins, from which it derives its name.
